# Salvatorian Sisters make a little go a long way

Sisters on the Frontlines began as a pilot project of Foundations and Donors
Interested in Catholic Activities (FADICA) with GHR Foundation and the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas. It soon grew into a Catholic Extension program with a wider alliance of nonprofits. The goal: Make 1,000 grants of \$1,000 each directly to Catholic Sisters to help people whose life struggles were compounded by the pandemic.

Sister Liza Segleau, SDS saw an opportunity to enhance support for her clients through *Sisters on the Frontlines*. She manages a Wisconsin Interdisciplinary Care Team (WICT) that assesses and intervenes for iCare members with complex medical and psychosocial needs. When Sr. Liza's \$1,000 grant was approved, she reached out to her care team to plan the best way to use the funds. News of the grant quickly made its way to iCare's CEO-President, who offered a 200% match. With funds totaling \$3,000, Sr. Liza's team helped a homeless expectant mother move into safe housing, a war veteran suffering from combat trauma avoid



eviction, and a heart transplant candidate with limited resources pay for travel and lodging for frequent out-of-town medical appointments.

Sr. Liza says her work fulfills our Founder Blessed Francis Jordan's vision for Salvatorians to dedicate our lives to serve *wherever* we are called. "iCare gives me a 'boost' in what I am called do. It's the perfect environment and the perfect population for me to reach out to and walk with."



**Sister Patrice Colletti, SDS** says COVID has begun to loosen its grip on the Lake Traverse Reservation tribal community she serves in northeast South Dakota. But she reminds us, "Mourning continues on many levels. The deaths of honored Elders and traditional spiritual leaders means a loss of the traditional language and culture."

Sr. Patrice's *Frontlines* grant is a blessing that has transformed an old storefront into WarCloud Drop In Center, named in memory of Paul WarCloud. He was a local artist, author and activist who dedicated his life to preserving tribal traditions and language until he died

in 1973. The WarCloud Center is a safe gathering place for people of all ages who live on the streets, in abandoned buildings, in the woods north of town, or at the local shelter. The building rehab is led by young tribal member Dawn Ryan. Dawn's

father was tribal chairman when Sr. Patrice served on the reservation 35 years ago. He was a man of vision whose leadership guided the tribe toward greater self-sufficiency. With volunteer labor, Dawn is honoring his legacy.

The WarCloud Center is a place for folks to access COVID shots, get masks, speak with a nurse volunteer, and get rides to a COVID test site two miles away. Families also come to the center to check on loved ones who struggle with addiction or mental illness.

Sr. Patrice says, "People are working together to create a safe space where families can process some of the trauma of this difficult time. This project witnesses to Gospel values and traditional Dakota values. The WarCloud Center is important to our reservation, but the grass roots effort that makes it possible is even more so. When people are part of creating a better life for their community, their families, it's powerful."

In cities across the U.S., COVID-19 caused thousands of people to lose their job – and then their home. Milwaukee was no exception. Early on, the CARES Act moratorium offered some tenants a reprieve. Since September 2020, tenants eligible for the CDC Moratorium got a temporary stay. Still, Milwaukee County saw hundreds of evictions.

Sr. Ellen also received a \$1,000 grant through *Sisters on the Frontlines*. She says, "By collaborating with Community

"It was a great joy to be present for the long awaited beatification of Blessed Francis Mary of the Cross Jordan on May 15th. Getting to Rome was challenging due to COVID-19 restrictions. Lay Salvatorian Jan Bitzan and I were allowed to travel to witness a once-in-a-lifetime event. And once-in-a-lifetime it was! The Basilica of St. John Lateran was absolutely awesome and I'll never forget curtains opening to unveil the beautiful colorful portrait of Blessed Francis Jordan. The long, joy-filled clapping that followed was astounding. Afterwards, our General Superior, Sister Maria Yaneth, graciously invited us to a celebration at the Motherhouse. It was a jubilant gathering of a 6-course meal and a special torte (sweet cake). A special prayer service followed our meal and a Mass of Thanksgiving the next day. To end our trip, we received a tour of the remodeled Salvatorian Fathers' Motherhouse chapel containing the remains of Blessed Jordan. On top of his tomb burns an eternal flame."

Amidst the many challenges we face throughout the world, we joyfully embrace the beatification of our founder, Father Francis Mary of the Cross Jordan. The "Year of Blessed Francis Jordan" officially began on July 21, 2021, his newly declared canonical feast day that coincides with the anniversary of his ordination. After a year of prayer and thanksgiving, our celebration will come to a close on July 21, 2022.

Advocates, we provided \$50-\$100 debit cards to help a dozen families move from temporary shelter to stable housing. The cards allowed recipients to decide what they needed to make their new housing a home. They used the funds for a variety of needs from rental application fees and moving costs, to retrieving household goods from storage or replacing essential items left behind upon eviction." For these families in desperate circumstances, those modest funds preserved a degree of dignity."

# 2021 Woman of Faith helps refugees build bridges by breaking bread

ocal restaurateur Caitlin Cullen met ✓Kai Yael Gardner Mishlove on a frigid Milwaukee Sunday in a room of mostly strangers. They gathered to talk about a pop-up dinner series for refugees who had been granted asylum in Milwaukee. Kai's vision was to sell tickets for dinners prepared by the refugees to provide income for their families. Kai also envisioned a far greater good: to build bridges between diverse cultures. That vision inspired Caitlin to nominate Kai for the Sisters of the Divine Savior 2021 Woman of Faith Award.

Caitlin describes Kai's aha moment. "Kai's inspiration began with voluntary home visits to refugee women in the Milwaukee area. Every household was always cooking and offered food as a form of welcome. Over time, friendships grew over a common bond — food." After sharing her idea with these newfound friends, Kai launched Tables Across Borders (TAB). Caitlin says, "In just a matter of weeks, Kai set up a three-month, six-dinner-series fundraiser highlighting cuisine from five different countries." She also points out that Kai runs TAB as a volunteer. "Kai devotes much of her free time to facilitate understanding of our 'new neighbors' who have walked very different paths and need support to adjust to a new life in the U.S."

Rev. Christie Melby-Gibbons endorsed Kai's nomination for the Woman of Faith Award. She runs Tricklebee Café, one of three local restaurants that hosted the first dinner series. Christie says, "It's delightful to see the chefs in our kitchens, making their traditional food to share with people who may have never had anything like it."

After the first dinner series, TAB hosted four more events from September 2019 through February 2020. It raised more than \$16,000 to support refugee chefs' families from 10 different nations. When the pandemic struck, Caitlin's Tandem Restaurant partnered with World Central Kitchen to continue supporting the refugee chefs and help struggling local restaurants. Others followed Tandem's lead, including

Tippecanoe Presbyterian Church Hungry Hearts Community Meals program and Milwaukee restaurants Amilinda and Damascus Gate.

TAB also pivoted to online cooking events in collaboration with Milwaukee's Lynden Sculpture Garden. The refugee chefs prepared cuisine from different countries with themes ranging from samosas, rice, wots (stews), desserts, breads and vegetables. Each real-time event featured chefs from different countries sharing recipes and cooking techniques. The online events continued to generate income and offered the chefs training and exposure. Kai adds, "It also heightened awareness of the refugees' positive contributions to our Milwaukee landscape. It has been an

incredible blessing and honor to witness their resilience and experience the beauty of their cultures, and connect that to my own."

In April 2021, Kai accepted a position with the Milwaukee Jewish Federation as Director of the Jewish Community Relations Council. Despite the demands of her new job, she remains dedicated to Tables Across Borders.

Caitlin says, "When I read the criteria for the Woman of Faith Award, I see a checklist of everything Kai is: servant, empath, teacher and translator." Rev. Christie agrees: "She is truly a carrier of the light, and she freely shines in whatever she does and wherever she goes. Kai is kind, empowering, joyful ... and is a gifted community organizer."
