erving on the Sisters of the Divine Savior U.S. Provincial Team is a call from God and your community of sisters. Members of our 2022-2025 Leadership Team possess the trust and support of their sisters and a willingness to guide their community toward new horizons.

Newly elected Provincial, **Sister Jean Schafer**, **SDS**, is rather familiar with leadership. In the 1980s, she served on an experienced Provincial Team, and from 1989-2002, she witnessed the compassionate nature of Salvatorian Sisters while serving as international leader in Rome. She reflects, "I was gifted in those periods to know sisters in many countries. I came to appreciate the rich wisdom of cultures and saw the miracles our sisters performed in impoverished settings. I saw firsthand how colonialization helped and hindered peoples. I experienced that, despite tensions among world governments, people are truly good and desirous of the same simple things we all hope for."

After her time on the international Generalate, she worked for over 20 years to further the cause of anti-human trafficking. Sr. Jean's gift of imagining solutions for issues big and small made her an effective advocate for survivors of exploitation and will guide her through unexpected situations that arise in Leadership. She says, "My role is to keep the spiritual dimension before us – the 'why' of our life. My focus

evotion to service, courage, and commitment are the building blocks of Frank Miller's nomination of Anne Haines for our 2022 Woman of Faith Award. Frank and Anne's friendship began in 2016 after he heard her speak at an Eat, Drink, and Be Catholic event in Milwaukee. Anne was sharing her deep admiration for Dorothy Day, co-founder of the Catholic Worker Movement, and her example of living the Catholic faith without compromise.

"Listening to Anne, I realized

she was a woman of exceptional faith. Since that meeting, I've come to know how deeply she believes in living

her faith..." Anne, at the time,

was working for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and would soon serve as Executive Director/Episcopal Representative for the Archdiocese's Urban Initiative Milwaukee. One of the Initiative's goals was to build a community and religious center in the 53206 zip code – one of the most incarcerated in the U.S. Anne spent three years developing relationships with

community members in this area, but unfortunately, COVID-19 shut the project down. Saddened by the dashing of one

dream, Anne decided to pursue another: opening a Catholic Worker House to serve Milwaukee's most vulnerable.

Relying on the expertise and experience of friends and colleagues, Anne established the St. Bakhita Catholic Worker House named after the patron saint of survivors of human trafficking and slavery. A gift from the Capuchins Franciscan, the aptly named House has two goals: model the Eight Beatitudes Jesus gave in his Sermon

on the Mount and, in partnership with the Franciscan

Community, provide survivors of sexual exploitation with a residential community. "For Anne, the Beatitudes are not hyperbole. They are not aspirational goals. They are her mission statement, and they have guided her actions for years," Frank says.

> Frank now serves as Secretary/Treasurer on St. Bakhita's board of directors along with John Cary as Board President. Both remain inspired by Anne's commitment to caring, loving, and serving. "It is an honor to call Anne a friend," John says, "and it is a true honor to work

with her while witnessing her role of servant leadership. I have often referred to her as 'a Saint walking this earth.' She is uncomfortable with this moniker as you might expect but she lives up to it through her caring actions."

Lisa Metz, theology chair at Divine Savior Holy Angels High School (DSHA), is also inspired by her friend's loving and hospitable nature. She says, "Anne doesn't look at her work as needing to fix people because they are broken. Instead, she sees the beauty in each and every individual. She embodies the idea of accompaniment, something that Pope Francis challenges us to do."

In fact, Anne so firmly believes in community and accompaniment that she forfeited a stable job and a comfortable house to move into the St. Bakhita House as its full-time director in May 2022. A move her support system, composed of six adult children and plenty of friends, recognize as a testimony to the courage faith provides. This courage, says Dr. Katie Pickart, director of Salvatorian Service at DSHA, was evident in Anne while collaborating with her for the students' 2021 Advent project benefiting St. Bakhita House.

"Anne has taken the leap. She has followed God's call for her life at every turn, and as she changes lives for the better, she has been fashioned into a radiant woman of faith," says Katie. Frank echoes this sentiment, "Anne once advised me, 'Commitment makes you happy.' Anne has committed to living the gospel. She has committed to emulating the lives of two of the 20th century's holiest women, Dorothy Day and St. Josephine Bakhita. Most of all she has committed to joining belief and action, love and community, hope and help. All day and every day."

Sister Bakhita Ndokole, SDS first met U.S. Salvatorians in an English as a Second Language (ESL) Immersion Program led by Sister Jenada Fanetti, SDS and Lay Salvatorian Sue Haertel in Tanzania. It's a program that changed her life and, ultimately, brought her to the United States this summer for more immersive ESL classes.

Under the expert tutelage of former teachers, Salvatorian Sisters Margaret Bosch, Marion Etzel, Mary Jo Stoffel, and Clarice Steinfeldt, Sr. Bakhita attended English lessons almost every day. Sr. Marion says, "Sr. Bakhita was a wonderful student. Even at an early hour, she was always ready for class. Eager to learn anything I taught her. We galloped through several books covering nature, animals, and Winnie the Pooh. She liked it all. She practiced speaking, reading, and writing. The time went so fast."

Sr. Margaret also enjoyed instructing Sr. Bakhita and only had kind things to say about her former student: "What has given me much joy while teaching and living in community with Sr. Bakhita is her growing confidence. It



is evident in her willingness to reach out to other Sisters and even telling jokes every once in a while. I will miss her smile."

Sr. Bakhita's language immersion went beyond the classroom to include diocesan mission appeal visits and outings throughout Milwaukee with her new friends. Accompanied by experienced mission appeal



sisters, she visited six parishes throughout the Midwest to thank parishioners for their support of our international missions. Following a mission appeal in the Green Bay area, she observed, "One American parish is not like another American parish. Some sing and others pray silently. They are all nice places to visit."

Although six times smaller than Tanzania's biggest city, Dar es Saalam, Sr. Bakhita enjoyed plenty of adventures in Milwaukee. She tasted sweet treats at Leon's Frozen Custard and the Wisconsin State Fair, gazed at the unique plants and animals at the Domes and Zoo, and spent many meals in the company of her U.S. sisters. Sister Liz Christensen, SDS says, "When S. Bakhita arrived in July she seemed shy and reluctant to talk - as I would be if I had just arrived in Tanzania to learn Swahili. Now I consider her a friend who is self-assured, funny, and generous. While staying at Salvatorian Sisters Residence she committed herself helping our less abled Sisters. She was also willing to try any food and discovered her liking of bacon and doughnut holes. I miss spending time with her but I look forward to keeping in touch via email."

Sister Jane Eschweiler, SDS, began her ministry as an English teacher at several Milwaukee schools before realizing her growing desire to teach the Word. She found the greatest satisfaction in parish pastoral work and adult faith formation in Michigan, Mississippi, Wisconsin, and in her 13 years serving on the Jordan Ministry Team (JMT) in Tucson, Arizona. She referred to the JMT's commitment to training laity for ministry as "an investment in the future of our Church." Sr. Jane was professed 53 years when she died on June 9, 2022.

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could be explained by questions I came across recently that fit so well for a Sister of the Divine Savior – not 'What would Jesus do?' but 'What did Jesus do.' and 'What is Jesus doing?' These questions take us back to the gospel and help us look for ways to further social transformation in our day-to-day ministries."

Sister Mary Lee Grady, SDS, Vicaress, says leadership is about making difficult decisions everyone may not understand. 
