Students at Divine Savior Holy
Angels (DSHA), nicknamed
Dashers, demonstrated remarkable

community spirit during Lent by partnering with the Salvatorian Sisters to raise a collaborative total of \$65,000, nearly

total of \$65,000, nearly double their initial goal of \$33,000. This impressive fundraising initiative will directly support the Social Foundation of Mary of the Apostles (SFMA) in Colombia, which is operated by the Salvatorian Sisters. Their mission focuses on empowering

women and transforming lives through vocational training programs.

"At DSHA, the values of service and compassion are at the core of everything we do. Our students, faculty, and staff exemplified this commitment by addressing the urgent needs of women, especially single mothers, in the Colombian cities of Cali and Quibdó," said Stephanie Monson, the school's Director of Campus Ministry. "The work of the Sisters is crucial in creating sustainable change in these communities, and the DSHA community has wholeheartedly rallied around this mission."

Throughout the Lenten season, the DSHA campus was filled with enthusiasm and activity, culminating in a lively Lenten Student Auction at the DSHA Commons. Students eagerly participated, bidding on a diverse array of unique items, from beautifully handcrafted goods to exclusive experiences like 'Breakfast with the DSHA Science Department.' This Lenten initiative not only generated excitement but also fostered a wonderful sense of compassion and unity among students as they came together for a noble cause—empowering women in Colombia.

Jon Melis, a DSHA Science teacher and auction chair, stated, "The success of this year's campaign not only exceeded our financial expectations but also deepened the bond between DSHA students and the Salvatorian Sisters. Together, we are ensuring that the vital resources needed to provide education and support to women in Colombia are available. With the funds raised, the SFMA can continue its impactful work, fostering economic stability and helping to create a brighter future for women and their families."

Reine Assana: A Radiant Beacon of Faith and Service

In the vibrant heart of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Reine Assana shines as a powerful symbol of faith and unwavering dedication to service. Originating from Ziguinchor, Senegal, Reine's transformative journey took a profound turn during her return to her hometown in 2015. Eagerly, she sought to witness a church built on the land her parents had generously donated to the community. However, to her dismay, she found a gathering of devoted worshippers in the open air, their humble altar merely a table adorned with care, surrounded by the elements of nature.

"The faithful came to worship with their chairs, and the altar was just a table nicely dressed," Reine reflected, her voice rich with emotion. This poignant scene sparked a deep resolve within her to complete the church project—an endeavor that would not only uplift her home

community but also honor the legacy of her parents, who embodied a spirit of love and service without formal theological training.

Being the youngest of 16 children, Reine drew inspiration from her parents' dedication to their neighborhood and faith. Following this path, she embarked on a remarkable journey to the United States, where she earned her master's in communication at Marquette University and later achieved her master's in theological studies from Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology in 2020. This educational foundation empowered her to

embark on a mission to unite African American Catholics and cultivate understanding between African and African American communities.

Reine plays a vital role as the public relations assistant for the National Association of African Catholics in the US (NAACUS) and serves as the national advisor to the Senegalese Apostolate—a crucial liaison with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' subcommittee on Pastoral Care for Migrants, Refugees, and Travelers. Her work reflects a profound commitment to healing the painful history that separated African Americans from their roots. "I believe that Africans and African Americans are the same people," she passionately expressed. "Our African American brothers and sisters were taken from the motherland, losing vital cultural values in that painful journey."

> In her pivotal role with the African Ministry of the Archdiocese, Reine fosters collaboration and community through initiatives like the Lenten Day of Reflection, encouraging

> > dialogue and support across cultural lines within the Catholic faith. Yet, her impact extends far beyond this. She is devoted to supporting African priests and seminarians through financial contributions toward their theological education and evangelization efforts. Understanding the immense challenges they face in adapting to a new environment, Reine ensures they feel a profound sense of belonging within

the local community. "These individuals have devoted their lives to serving the Lord, often sacrificing promising careers," she stated. "It is vital for them to know that they are not alone, and that we stand beside them."

At Blessed Savior Parish, Reine's energy invigorates the spiritual community, as she engages in numerous faith-based organizations, including the African Catholic Ministry Committee and the Black Catholic Ministry Commission. Her involvement underscores her commitment to fostering inclusivity and cultural appreciation within the Church.

Her remarkable influence reaches beyond religious services into the broader community as well. Reine played a crucial role in founding the Milwaukee African Women's Association (MAWA), providing a supportive network for women seeking a sense of belonging far from home. Additionally, she spearheaded the organization of the 2024 African Cultural Festival, an event that not only celebrates African heritage but also raises essential funds for educational programs benefiting refugee families in Milwaukee. This festival serves as a vibrant platform for community bonding and cultural exchange, enriching the social fabric of Milwaukee while promoting education for immigrant families.

Reine's resilience and determination are especially noteworthy as she navigates the intricate balance of raising her children while actively contributing to the community and furthering her education. "I continue to marvel at her ability to juggle her responsibilities while serving others," shared a fellow parishioner. "Her spirit is truly awe-inspiring."

Reine Assana is the embodiment of the Woman of Faith Award, her life a powerful narrative of commitment and purpose. By uniting cultures, addressing the needs of marginalized communities, and uplifting those around her, she exemplifies the essence of Christian love

SR. JOAN WAGNER


